CITY FOCUSED ON BETTER POLICIES TO SERVE OLDER ADULTS

On May 14th Mayor Pro Tem Vanessa Fuentes and Council Member Marc Duchen co-hosted a town hall event focused on the needs of Austin's aging population. The interest in the town hall exceeded initial expectations so much so that it prompted a change to a larger venue. The attendance was more than 120 and Vanessa Fuentes described it as "our biggest turnout yet!" She described attendees by saying, "they wanted to hear what the city had to offer in terms of services, information and resources...it really solidified the need for a policy direction from Council on the quality of life for our older adults."

According to the City of Austin, residents between the ages of 65 and 74 represent the fastest growing age group in Austin and the demand for services is outpacing the city's what the city has invested. There is also concern that the city's current efforts are lacking results. A 2022 report from the city auditor found that the city does not have an effective way to measure its progress serving older adults and older adults frequently mention a lack of awareness about what aging services exist.

After the May 14th town hall, Vanessa Fuentes sponsored a City Council resolution directing the city manager to

take greater steps to ensure that all departments offer services aligned with the goals of the city's Age-Friendly Action Plan. With this latest move, City Council is reaffirming its commitment to the goals outlined in the Age-Friendly Action Plan originally adopted in 2016. Those goals are categorized into 8 domains of livability, such as housing, transportation, services, social participation, and outdoor space.

As part of efforts to better serve older adults, the City of Austin is conducting a first-ever Quality of Life Study on Aging. The goal of this study is to best understand the needs of older adults in Austin, their caregivers, and how best to serve them.

GET YOUR FREE FAN WITH SUMMER FAN DRIVE

Heat is the #1 weatherrelated killer in the U.S., and children, older adults, and even pets are among the most at-risk groups.



The week of June 23 brought blistering and record-breaking temperatures across the northeast and southeast. CBS News reported that on Wednesday June 25 temperatures in the southeast were "10 - 20 degrees" above average, and with the heat index some areas are seeing temperatures that feel like 110. As summer temperatures rise, a simple fan can help protect your health and reduce energy costs.

- A fan can lower the temperature in a room by up to 8 degrees.
- Using a fan instead of A/C can help reduce your electric bill.

Family Eldercare launched their annual Summer Fan Drive in May, and as an RBJ resident you are likely eligible to receive a free box fan.

All residents who hold a lease at The Lady Bird are members of the Resident Council and can attend and participate in Resident Council meetings, events, and activities. In addition, a steering committee of five appointed residents take on additional responsibilities to help plan, coordinate, and support the continuity of Resident Council.

Our Duties / Why We Are Here

- 1. Communicate problems and other needs of the fellow residents to the RBJ Senior Housing Board of Directors.
- 2. Identify property improvements that may be needed.
- 3. Make recommendations to the RBJ Senior Housing Board of Directors for the types of services the nonprofit should be providing for residents.

Group Agreements

Group agreements are essential for creating a safe, productive, and collaborative environment. Resident Council members are expected to uphold our group agreements during meetings:

- 1. Raise your hand to speak.
- 2. Respect differences in opinion.
- 3. Try to be brief with your remarks to allow others time. Avoid interruptions.
- 4. Ask questions if there is something you do not understand.
- 5. Be open to new ideas, possibilities, and ways of thinking.



BLUE KOI BOY

As a bored Navy wife while my husband was at sea, I took on an exciting hobby. I was profoundly interested in a coffee table book on the art and science of raising koi fish by Chinese koi masters.



I was fortunate to contact a koi fish hobbyist and receive his guidance in raising exhibition koi fish. He advised me in the science of water balance, tank type, size, cleaning and fish for the tank. I bought, according to his advice, goldfish. Initially, I was put off by their dull, black color but reserved my judgement. Gradually the fish lost their dullness and became a brilliant orange gold color. One of them was lacking a dorsal fin but I figured it was a characteristic fish variation.

Over several years the koi fish took on amazing patterns and colors, their bodies becoming plump. There was one fish in the tank that I fell in love with. His color was grey blue with scales that shined like. His fins were diaphanous long scarves. I called him Blu Boi. He would stare at me through the tank glass. I would interact with him by wiggling my index finger. One day I noticed a growth developing over Blu Boi's head. I called the koi hobbyist about it. He stated that the growth would soon cover two thirds of the fish's body, a genetic variation. Ancient koi masters once called it a lion head. I felt very honored to have such a noble fish.

Then the Navy called. My husband and I prepared to move away. I sold Blue Boi back to the hobbyist as highly valued exhibition fish. I cried about the loss and considered having a tattoo of him made on my inner arm so he would always be with me.

Even today I miss Blue Boi.
